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TOP STORIES

On Monday, February 12, EPA released their [final Strategic Plan](#), the [FY19 Budget Proposal](#), and the [FY19 Budget in Brief](#), in conjunction with the [President's Budget](#). The following excerpt regarding EPA is from page 106 of the President's Budget:

Refocuses the Agency on Core Activities. As part of the Administration's initiative to refocus EPA on its core mission, the President's Budget continues to eliminate funding for lower priority programs, programs that have duplicative functions with other agencies, activities that can be absorbed into other functions, and responsibilities that should be primarily for State and local governments. Examples of program eliminations include: the Climate Change Research and Partnership Programs; the Indoor Air and Radon Programs; the Marine Pollution and National Estuary Programs; the Environmental Education Program; and the Beaches Program. Total savings from eliminated EPA programs and activities would save taxpayers approximately \$600 million compared to 2017 enacted levels.

EPA Listening Sessions on the Proposed Repeal of the Clean Power Plan

Please hold February 28 if you're interested in attending one of three listening sessions the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is planning on its intention to repeal the Carbon Pollution Emission Guidelines for Existing Stationary Sources: Electric Utility Generating Units, commonly referred to as the Clean Power Plan. The west coast listening session will be held on **Wednesday, February 28**, at the San Francisco Main Public Library in the Koret Auditorium, 30 Grove Street, San Francisco, CA 94102, from **8:30 AM to 7:30 PM PST**. EPA will host three sessions throughout the day that will be structured and run identically:

- Session 1 from 8:30 AM to 12:50 PM;
- Session 2 from 1:00 to 4:50 PM; and
- Session 3 from 5:00 to 7:30 PM PST.

AmeriCorps Individual Placement (IP) with Grand Staircase Escalante Partners

This is a field position to complete work on the Escalante River Restoration Project, which focuses on non-native woody invasive removal, mainly Russian olive, along the Escalante River and its tributaries in southern Utah. The main task of this job will be to conduct treatments of invasive plants on public lands, as directed, including new treatment, retreatment, and monitoring through the proper use and handling of herbicides, tools, chainsaws, and backcountry logistics. This may require carrying heavy packs over rough terrain for up to 10 miles one way to reach project sites. The woody invasive restoration project also includes taking an active role in managing conservation corps crews and volunteers in their work on this project throughout the season. This position is full-time season from approximately March - Nov 2018.

Your participation will aid the TGG in understanding the current capacity, needs, and challenges of tribal environmental data management. Your input will help inform strategies that elevate tribal issues and communicate the need for adequate resources, and appropriate technical and financial support to sustain tribal environmental programs into the future.

Tribal Practices for Wellness in Indian Country (RFA-DP18-1812PPHF)

CDC convened tribal health leaders to increase understanding of tribal practices that strengthen physical and mental health, wellbeing, tribal identity, and connection to culture to better support the work tribes and their members do to stay healthy and well.

This 3-year [Notice of Funding Opportunity](#) supports tribal practices identified by tribal health leaders that build resiliency and connections to community, family, and culture, which over time, can reduce risk factors for chronic disease among American Indians and Alaska Natives. Recipients will include up to 14 American Indian Tribes, Alaska Native villages, or American Indian or Alaska Native tribally designated organizations. No more than two awards to tribes and tribal organizations will be made within a single Indian Health Service Area. Up to 14 Urban Indian Organizations will also be funded to address the same strategies for that portion of their patient populations that is American Indian and Alaska Native.

Recipients will address these strategies:

- Connect cultural teachings to health and wellness
- Seasonal cultural practices that support health and wellness
- Social and cultural activities that promote community wellness
- Collaborations that strengthen wellbeing
- Intergenerational learning that supports wellbeing and resilience
- Promote traditional healthy foods
- Promote traditional and contemporary physical activities

The NOFO will include evaluation to strengthen the evidence-base for this approach in tribal communities. The long-term goals are to reduce morbidity and mortality due to heart disease, stroke, cancer and diabetes.

The annual *Robert Holden Tribal Environmental Exchange Network Achievement Award* is presented to a project, program, or individual working with the EPA Exchange Network resources to expand the technical capacity of one or more tribal environmental programs.

Nominations will be reviewed by the [Tribal Governance Group](#) and the award will be presented at the [2018 Tribal Exchange Network Conference](#), February 27-28, 2018 in Tucson, AZ.

Eligibility and criteria are as follows:

Project

- Insightful project idea to benefit tribal environmental program management
- Delivers superior performance of tribal environmental project management practices
- Provides superior tribal environmental data management and/or data analysis results
- Streamlines work processes for tribal environmental program(s)
- Project must have been completed no more than 24 months before the application deadline

Program

- Demonstrates superior organizational project management abilities by adding value to its tribal organization through its support of successful strategic initiatives
- Program established a vision for value delivery and has had a positive and clear impact on tribal environmental business results

Individual
